



Kasten to pursue alternate engery play for the future

f you ever feel like hunkering down for a good conversation about nuclear engineering, the colonization of humans on Mars or the moon, the SpaceX program, Helium 3 power, Uranium or Plutonium, Brandon Valley senior Aiden Kasten is your guy. Kasten is headed to the U.S. Naval Academy in June to study nuclear engineering. He calls it a huge passion, especially in regards to the future of energy. "It's predicted that the first energy that's going to

be used on the first colonies of humanity are going to be powered by nuclear power," he said. "Nuclear engineering is fascinating to me. I looked at college options and I learned that the Navy ranks towards the tops for nuclear engineering."

Plus, serving in one of the country's four branches of the military was a draw for Kasten. His grandfather, James Heronimus, served in the Vietnam War as a jeep technician in the Army and died in 2012 to lung cancer due to Agent Orange complications.

As a child, Kasten said he had visions of being an astronaut. Now, that's clearly not out of the question. The Naval Academy has had 55 graduates the most in NASA history – to graduate into the space program, including Jim Lovell, who was portrayed by Tom Hanks in the motion picture Apollo 13.

Kasten also knocked around the idea of being a botanist, the scientific study of plants. That later changed to nuclear engineering.

"Because engineering is a lot more interesting than plants," he said.

He'll wear BRANDON VALLEY on his chest a few more times yet this spring throwing the shot put on the track & gield team, but the move to Annapolis is fast approaching. He visited the historic Maryland city about 30 miles east of Washington, D.C. last year, and said he fell in love with it.

He's been preparing for his initiation into the Academy by staying physically fit and mentally strong. After reporting on June 28, he'll be processed on the

29th or 30th. From there, it's boot camp run by drill instructors who were in his same position three years

"They're drilling into you just as much as they were drilled into," he said. "There's a lot of running, physical activities, mental torments. You just try and get through it."

If confidence is a key to get through it, then Kasten should be just fine. The National Honor Society student said he will take general courses and standardized leadership courses this fall before digging into his specialized interests.

Before classes begin and Kasten is battling his way through boot camp this summer, he'll also have to be disciplined when it comes to technology. Each entering Midshipman is allowed just two phone calls home during the summer.

Although admittedly a little anxious, Kasten said he's ready.

BVHS senior trio pledges to be future teachers

Future Teachers Pledge

On May 6, before a small crowd of family, friends and Brandon Valley educators and administrators, a trio of seniors from BV's Class of 2022, each signed the "Future Teachers Pledge." While each signee plans to teach different subjects at different levels, all three are choosing the profession to make a difference in the lives of children, just as educators have impacted their

On Friday, Naomi Poppe, who teaches "Teachers in Training" at BVHS, organized the "career signing."

"This is just them taking their own pledge saying that they want to be a teacher," said Poppe, who also supervises BVHS's Educators Rising program.

Educators Rising is a national network that provides passionate young people with hands-on teaching experience, sustains their interest in the profession, and helps them cultivate the skills they need to be successful educators. Since its August

2015 launch, more than 30,000 students and teachers across the country have joined the network, including Brandon Valley, which has been active in the program for three years.

Although BV's Educators Rising program is only five members

strong, Poppe said it's exciting to see their enthusiasm for the profession.

"Right now, being a teacher is not necessarily the easiest. There's a lot of tough stuff that we have to deal with ... but they have just fallen in love with it," she said.

Now seeing the benefits of Educators Rising with her own students, Poppe wish-

school, possibly middle school English. And Heiberger wants to teach Early Childhood Special Education kids.

Spencer said she has known she would pursue a career in education. She did, after all, have several role models within her bloodline. Her grandmother taught English, and her aunts taught kindergarten and reading, respectively.

She also gives credit to the "amazing teachers" she had herself, "like Mr. (Brady) Olson and Sarah Andera, a deaf educator, which inspired my passion to go into deaf education," Spencer said.

Spencer said Educators Rising has provided her with a more in-depth perspective of the profession.

"We've gotten to go to a lot of expos, which really helped and we got to hear from great educators, where I learned the most about special education. People have touched the top of special education, but I went to this expo and this woman had a great presentation on special education and what goes into it, and I found that really interesting," she said.

With a desire to return to teach for the

district that taught her, Spencer says that

may not be possible. "I'd love to come back here and teach. I would love for the South Dakota School for the Deaf to be back in Sioux Falls, however, with my career aspirations of being a deaf educator, I think I might have to go out of state. If there is an opportunity for me to come home, I'll come home,"

Risty was influenced by her dad, Jeremy a teacher at BVHS. He's just one of a variety of educators within her family, as well.

"It kind of runs through my family," she says. "I haven't really considered anything else. I'm not good with medical stuff, I'm not good with science or math. English has always been a thing that I'm good at, so I think that's been a consistent thing, and so I thought, 'What can I do with English?' and teaching popped up."

Following in her parent's footsteps by enrolling at the University of South Dakota, Risty said her involvement in Educators Rising has a been a true game changer.

"It's created a lot of connections with a

Living Mytruth

BV senior expresses himself through original song

ntil now, Brendon Sheppard didn't view himself in the way that he wanted to see himself. You see, Brendon was born Brianna Sheppard.

"I always felt like I was kind of 'weird,' like 'an alien,'" says the 2022 Brandon Valley High School senior.

He says there were signs. Even as a youngster.

"I played with (Barbie) dolls a little bit, but when I got my first Ken doll, that's when it really hit me, like I like playing with Ken dolls and blocks and cars a lot more than I did with the girl dolls."

At 11, Brendon wanted to cut his hair really short.

"But everybody said it was too masculine and it didn't look good, so I started putting barrettes and headbands in my hair, and people said it looked better."

Still, Brendon didn't seem himself as "Brianna."

That was four years ago. It was then that he made the decision to cut his hair short again and began exploring his gender identity.

"I kind of had that mindset where everything leading up to that point wasn't really who I saw myself as, just rather what everybody else told me to do. Like dress this way. Act this way. You need to be prettier. You need to be thin. Stuff like that. I never really saw myself that way, so four years ago is when I started exploring my gender identity," he shares.

Brendon first tried out non-binary pronouns, which are 'They' and 'Them' instead of 'He/Him or She/Her.' I did that for a few months, and I was like there was still something missing, so I tried out some 'He/Him' pronouns and that seemed to really fit. It made me a lot happier being addressed as a guy instead of a girl. I was looking around at some different names, and I actual-

ly looked up a baby name site, and I typed in 'cool names for guys.' Brendon was one of them, so I started going by that."

Earlier this year, Brendon shared his new identity in an original song, "Living My Truth," at the BVHS Choir Variety Show. It was his first public performance since learning to play the guitar in recent months. He'd been working on the lyrics for about a year, which he said started with the chorus.

I have known all my life that I was meant to fight Hoping, praying that I could be the boy that I wanna be And it's not a phase To finally know my name

So here I am standing strong Living my truth "Even when I was younger, I prayed that if I were a boy, things would be so much easier. I remember

going to bed every night praying that I would wake up as a boy," he said. "Last Christmas, I got a guitar and I started thinking, 'What if I put it all together and actually make something of it?' Then, the talent show came around and I was

like, this would be a really cool way to express myself and kind of put myself out there in the school."

Before taking the stage that night, Brendon remembers the nervous feelings he was experiencing.

"I was sweating so bad," he said. As he walked off the stage that night, Brendon said he was smiling ear to ear.

"I was still shaking and sweating, but everybody came up to me and said I did such a good job. They started calling me by my preferred name and I got those butterflies and everything felt right," he said.

Brendon said his friends and peers at BVHS have accepted his new identity.

Although legality won't allow his diploma to read "Brendon Sheppard," at his request, he will be donning a black gown for Sunday's commencement and will be called up on stage by his preferred name.

While friends and classmates have accepted his change, he says some members of his family are "on the fence" but "are getting there."

"My siblings are actually very supportive. My little brother, I remember coming out into the living room and saying, 'Guys, I'm a guy.' My younger

brother said, 'I have another brother!' and 'That's so cool,! and then he started jumping up and down, he was so excited about it."

Not yet 18, Brendon said

he plans to visit with doctors about transitioning his body from female to male. He also plans to legally change his name.

In the meantime, Brendon will contincontinued on page 8

lot of different people," she said, noting a few students from Harrisburg also planning to pursue education. "I was able to visit with a lot of different schools, like the University of Sioux Falls and South Dakota State for different competitions, and so that expanded my connections."

She, too, has found great benefit for her involvement in BV's Educators Rising chapter.


"This just felt like the perfect opportunity for me to do something I love and I can also have an impact in m community," she said.

ue to work for Sunshine Foods and sell his drawings to save for the personal changes he intends to make. He envisions himself having a longer face, "not as chubby," he said. "I imagine having a 5 o'clock shadow and shaved hair. A couple years from now, I'm saving up to get top surgery so I can remove my breast tissue, and when I look in the mirror, I imagine that it's just

flat." In recent months, Brendon started the All Students Welcome club at BVHS. It's grown to a "membership" of about a dozen students.

"It's not just transgender people. It's people

of color, people who are gay, bi, lesbian, anybody who wants to come is welcome," he said. "We talk about issues in our school and what's happening outside of school, and I would say all of the people that are there are my friends."

No matter the name he chooses to go by -"Brendon" or "Brianna" -Brendon said he's still the same person inside.

"I'm still the same person, but I definitely have more of an open mind to other people's identities and I definitely think I'm more open to how everybody else lives their life," he said.

Ellen Joseph conquers the world of speech and debate

llen Joseph is rarely at a loss for words.

When the 2022 senior graduates, she'll leave as one of Brandon Valley High's most decorated students in the world of speech, debate and oral interp.

For starters, Joseph is a three-year qualifier for the National Speech and Debate Tournament. In June, she heads to Louisville, Ky. The past two years, Joseph was among the top 30 high school students in the country in all three events that she competed in.

Earlier this spring, she was awarded the Rozella Blunk Interp Away by the SD Forensic Coaches Association.

"This is an award given to the top interp kids in the state," explains Gina Koehn-Rief, who teaches English at BVHS and is the speech and interp coach. At this time, Joseph is at the top of the NSDA point standings in South Dakota. "This is unusual for an interp kid," Koehn Rief said. "Usually, that spot is held by debate kids."

Joseph is ranked No. 1 in the state in poetry, dram, program of interp and duo. She is also is an Academic All-American, as determined by the NSDA.

"One of the most amazing things she has accomplished, though, is her national ranking in drama. Out of the thousands of kids in the country who do drama, Ellen spent her whole senior year ranked No. 6 in the country," Koehn-Rief said.

Shes's racked up 1,098 points in just that event.

"If she got a ranking of 1 in every performance, those points mean she has performed a drama at least 183 times," Koehn-Rief said, noting Joseph's 2,518 overall point total. That number translates to over 420 performances in four years, "and that's just if she got

a 1 in every round," Koehn said. "That is 70 hours of actual competition time. It's almost impossible to calculate the number of hours of practice that represents."

Joseph has not shied away from the tough pieces. Every piece she has chosen has repre-

Joseph has not shied away from the tough pieces. Every piece she has chosen has represented issues that are important and personal to her.

As the daughter of two veterans, Joseph selected a piece to honor that segment of her family history. Her dram is the story of a military mom whose son is killed in action while deployed in Iraq. Joseph's poetry program centers on the Alzheimer's disease. In this piece, she pays tribute to her grandfather who suffers from this disease, in addition to her grandmother, who is his caretaker.

"One of her proudest moments – and most emotional – this year was having her grandparents in the audience to hear her perform this piece," Koehn-Rief said. Joseph came away from the SDHSAA state interp festival in December with a superior rating on both pieces and a perfect score in poetry.

She's been a fixture at the state competition, having attended three years and competed in nine events, from which she garnered a superior in every one of them, four of which a perfect score was achieved.

Koehn-Rief said she saw something special as Joseph prepared her pieces as a freshman. "I knew she was going to be good," Koehn-Rief said. "I had no idea four years ago just how good she was going to be! The fun part is, I have kids coming up who not only look up to and admire her, but are determined to pass up her point total just like she was determined to pass the point totals of kids who were successful in her freshman year. She is leaving a great legacy at BVHS."


